

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CURBING THE MENACE OF RAGGING

Ragging, a deeply entrenched tradition in many educational institutions, continues to cast a dark shadow on the lives of countless students. Often perceived as harmless fun or a rite of passage, ragging has evolved into a menace that undermines the very purpose of educational institutions, fostering a culture of fear, humiliation, and even physical harm. Ragging can take various forms, ranging from seemingly harmless pranks and verbal abuse to more severe physical and psychological harassment

The effects of ragging can be both immediate and long-term, impacting various aspects of a student's life, ranging from fear, humiliation, and constant stress associated with ragging can lead to anxiety, depression, post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), and other mental health issues. Sometimes escalate to escalate to physical violence, severe emotional distress, Suicidal Tendencies, drop outs. To address the issue of ragging the institutes need to Implement mentorship programs to provide guidance and support in a constructive manner. The freshers will be allotted faculty members as "mentors" who will handhold them. Conduct orientation programs and awareness campaigns that emphasize the negative consequences of ragging and encourage students to report incidents without fear. Faculty and administration should actively support and enforce anti-ragging policies and be approachable for students who need assistance. Confidential counselling services for students who have been victims of ragging to help them cope with the psychological trauma

THE DEAD DO TELL TRUE TALES

Yes, it's true Dead do tell true tales about the heinous sexual crimes prevailing in the society and the need of raising the awareness about prevention of sexual abuse and heinous crime against vulnerable children irrespective of male and female gender in the society. Let my country awake.

Forensic Medicine is a challenging branch in aiding the investigating agencies and judiciary system of the country in implementing punishments for the accused with scientific evidence and meticulous autopsy procedures and in maintaining chain of custody of the biological samples collected during autopsy.

A male boy aged 3 years was brought to mortuary for autopsy by police with a brief history of 3 episodes of diarrhoea at school who was declared brought dead by Gandhi Hospital Doctors and was registered as Medico-Legal Case (MLC) following the Medico-Legal protocols.

History of the case (as per inquest report): The parents of the boy are from below poverty line, daily wage labourers. The boy had 3 episodes of stools at Anganwadi centre, the parents at work requested the male neighbour to pick up the boy from school. The male neighbour on request of parents, picks up the boy from school and reaches home. After 15 minutes, the parents receives call from the male neighbour that the boy fell unconscious and unresponsive.

The parents reach home, shifts boy to Gandhi Hospital for treatment, unfortunately the boy was declared brought dead. There was no suspicion for both parents about any foul play. Medico-legal case was registered only because, the boy was Brought Dead to hospital. The Police concluded it might be a Natural Disease/Dehydration after preliminary investigation and to further conclude exact cause of death approached Gandhi Forensic Medicine Department to confirm the natural cause of death.

On meticulous autopsy and examination there were multiple external and internal blunt injuries in head, chest and abdomen cavity including linear fracture of skull bone, fresh in nature.

The examination of the orifice revealed an abnormally lax anal opening for a boy of age 3 years with a forensic eye. The anal swabs were collected for semen analysis and DNA fingerprinting with a suspicion of sexual abuse and homicide.

Forensic autopsy revealed the internal injuries were homicidal in nature. Analysis of the anal swabs preserved detected semen – spermatozoa confirming the sexual assault. The identity of the accused was revealed by DNA Fingerprinting of semen.

The crime was homicide with sexual assault of a male child. The accused was identified as the male neighbour who picked up the boy from school and had been sexually assaulting the child for 6 months, as revealed by the elder brother of the deceased to police during the investigation. Justice was served to the victim boy through a meticulous autopsy and scientific evidence provided by the Forensic Professor, Dr. G Lavanya Kowsil. The biological sample preserved during the autopsy played a key role in identifying the crime, criminal and the silent prolonged sexual abuse of the vulnerable Male Child.

A death mimicked as Natural was confirmed to be Homicide/Murder with Sexual Assault. Judgement was passed with life imprisonment to the accused with fine. A case suggesting even male children are vulnerable to sexual abuse.

Had we taken the Police Inquest & cause of death as due to a Natural Disease / Dehydration on its face value, the Case would have been closed as a Natural Death and Injustice would have been meted to the innocent Child, the family and the Society at large. A death mimicked as Natural was Confirmed to be Homicidal / Murder with Sexual Assault in a male child based on meticulous Postmortem Examination.

Though the details vary, the story is much the same with every small victim. We must wake up as a society to the reality of those who prey upon our most vulnerable. For the sake of our children, we must open our eyes, talk openly about abuse, and protect the innocent. The dead have so much to tell us, if we just listen.

AN AIRWAY CHALLENGE FOR ANESTHESTIST

The use of video laryngoscopy continues to play a larger role in the approach to patients with airway pathology. Looking specifically at patients with potential difficulty in ventilation and intubation due to thyroid goitre, video laryngoscopy may provide a faster and easier technique to secure the airway compared to direct laryngoscopy.

In the case we present to you, a 70-year-old male with a large multinodular goiter of 13x12.7x9.5 cm with h/o difficulty in swallowing 1 year & h/o change in voice 8 months posted for total thyroidectomy whose airway which is anticipated to be difficult was intubated using video laryngoscope.





CASE REPORT:

Patient was assessed & his Pre operative vitals were BP 130/80 mmHg PR89/min SPO2 98% on room air.

CBP, RFT, LFT, Serum Electrolytes were within normal limits, USG Neck shows TIRADS IV Lesion, Lateral neck X Ray shows enlarged pre tracheal & Prevertebral shadow, VLS shows lateral pharyngeal wall pushed to left & Trachea was deviated to left. 2D Echo shows concentric LVH with EF 60% & grade 1 DDF.

After explaining the anesthetic procedure & obtaining consent from patient & his attenders, patient was shifted to OT. 16G & 18G IV cannula were secured in right & left hand respectively & standard ASA monitors were connected. General endotracheal anesthesia was planned using video laryngoscope.

Preoxygenation with 100% Oxygen for 3 mins, Premedication with Glycopyrrolate 0.2mg iv, Fentanyl 100mcg iv, Induction with propofol 100mg iv & Sevoflurane 4-6%. After giving Succinylcholine 100mg under video laryngoscopy guidance with the help of bougie 8.0mm & 7.5 mm was unable to pass through the cords. 6.5mm internal diameter endotracheal tube was passed through vocal cord & B/L Air entry confirmed & fixed at 22cm. Vecuronium Loading dose 6mg iv given. Maintenance with N2O:O2 3:2 &Sevoflurane 1-2 Vol%, Vecuronium 1mg every 30 mins. Intraop 1500ml RL, 1000 ml NS, 2 Packed red blood cells transfusion was done. Blood loss was around 1200ml.

Intraop fall in BP was noted, Noradrenaline & Dopamine support started, BP improved & Dopamine & Nor Adrenaline was weaned off. At the end of surgery under DLV 6.5 mm endotracheal tube exchanged with 8.0mm armoured endotracheal tube & patient was shifted to ICU over Bains circuit.

DISCUSSION:

The use of video laryngoscopy in patients presenting with airway pathology including, but not limited to a goitre should be carefully considered as a first line tool over direct laryngoscopy. This patient population benefits from thorough pre- operative evaluation, as there are a number of risk factors specific to patients with goitres that predict difficult intubation and ventilation due to upper airway obstruction. It is in the best interest of the patient for the anaesthesiologist to intubate quickly to avoid prolonged obstruction, minimize trauma and avoidance of difficult to intubate circumstances.

CONCLUSION:

The anaesthesiologist has many techniques to choose from when confronted with goitre. In comparison to direct laryngoscopy, video laryngoscopy has shown a benefit in terms of ease of use, time to intubate, first attempt success, lower Cormack-Lehane scores, and lower IDS both in patients undergoing thyroidectomy and patients with difficult intubation risk factors. Its use should be considered as a first line tool to intubate these patients.

WHEN NOTHING GOES RIGHT, GO LEFT

A 13-year-old girl had been feeling unusually fatigued and her skin took a pale, yellowish hue. Concerned, she visited her family doctor, who ordered a series of blood tests, including a complete blood count (CBC) and two blood transfusions.

Life had its own twists; she was about to face a medical challenge which she had never anticipated. A week later, her condition worsened and she came to the department of medicine with generalised weakness. Examination revealed marked pallor, jaundice, hepatomegaly (6 cm from costal margin) and moderate splenomegaly (up to umbilicus). Blood tests were ordered and the results were alarming.

Her CBP revealed a significant drop in her red blood cell count, and her haemoglobin levels were critically low(2.9 gm/dl), with MCV: 132 fl, MCH: 116 pg, MCHC: 87.9 g/dl, normal total leucocyte counts and platelets. Peripheral smear showed marked RBC agglutination with microcytes, tear drop cells, 8 nucleated RBCs per 100 WBC and no hemiparasites. Liver function tests revealed a total bilirubin: 7.24 mg/dl and indirect bilirubin: 5.64 mg/dl.

As her condition worsened, a severe case of anaemia was suspected and it was decided that blood transfusions were necessary to address her severe anaemia. However, this was not a straightforward process. Her blood type was tricky. Blood grouping revealed an AB+ blood group by *FORWARD GROUPING TECHNIQUE*, and cross matching yielded many samples unfit for transfusion. Her family and friends rallied around her, offering unwavering support and encouragement during this challenging time. They understood the gravity of her condition and the critical importance of finding compatible blood for her transfusion.

Gandhi hospital's blood bank worked diligently to find a suitable match for her, but it was a painstaking process. They had to perform extensive tests to ensure that the transfused blood wouldn't be immediately destroyed. Day after day, her condition deteriorated as she anxiously waited for the lifesaving blood that seemed so elusive.

As the saying goes "WHEN NOTHING GOES RIGHT, GO LEFT", the department of pathology was consulted in this context and now Blood grouping was done by *REVERSE TECHNIQUE* which resulted as O+. In view of blood group discrepancy, a repeat blood grouping at room temperature showed AB+, after warm elution, it showed as O+ group.

Immediately further tests were scheduled to determine the cause. Her blood was drawn for a Coombs test, and Direct & Indirect Coombs test was positive (4+), a diagnostic tool used to detect autoimmune haemolytic anaemia (AIHA). Further DAT screening revealed Ig G POSITIVE (4+), Ig M POSITIVE(3+), C3d POSITIVE(3+).A diagnosis of mixed autoimmune haemolytic anaemia was made, a rare condition where the immune system mistakenly identifies its red blood cells as foreign invaders and attacks them. Her own body was destroying her precious red blood cells at both warm and cold temperatures leading to anaemia.



Agglutinated blood sample-RBCs are already coated by antibodies so forward grouping which detects antigens on RBCs is not reliable.

Reverse grouping- which detects Anti A and Anti B antibodies in the serum is positive, indicating the patient's blood group is O+.

She was started on oral Prednisolone 40 mg and after two days blood transfusion was done, the transfusion went smoothly, and the new blood provided her body with the strength it desperately needed. Over time, her condition improved. With the steroid treatment her immune system was gradually brought under control, and her red blood cells started to recover. Follow-up after 2 weeks of steroid therapy showed improvement in patient's general condition and blood parameters. Haemoglobin: 9.6, Total bilirubin: 1.8, Direct bilirubin: 0.4.

Haemolytic anemias are suspected when jaundice, anaemia and splenomegaly are present. Inherited causes of haemolytic anemia must be ruled out in all cases. Acquired haemolytic anaemias are also due to an array of causes like drugs, infections, autoimmunity and allo immunity. Severe anemia warrants an immediate blood transfusion, hence discrepancy in blood grouping and unavailability of blood due to cross-matching creates problems in immediate patient care. In this scenario, artificial blood can be a great alternative and should be researched on extensively.

If there is a suspicion of autoimmune haemolytic anaemia, Direct coomb's test positivity indicates an autoimmune cause, whereas Indirect coomb's test suggests alloimmunity like a mismatched blood transfusion. Both direct and indirect coomb's test positivity in this patient indicate there is autoimmune haemolysis as well as antibodies against foreign RBCs, probably due to previous blood transfusions. DAT screening helped clinch the diagnosis. Warm antibody haemolytic anaemias respond to steroids, whereas cold haemolytic anaemias are known to be refractory to steroids and need the use of Rituximab. The patient responded to steroids indicating that steroids might be beneficial in a mixed haemolytic anaemia picture.

The above story emphasizes the importance of meticulous examination, reasonable analysis and the invaluable role of healthcare professionals in saving lives and restoring hope even in the face of complex and rare medical conditions.

INFERTILITY

Infertility affects 48.5 million couples and has an impact on their families and communities. The estimates as per WHO suggests that approximately one in every six people of reproductive age worldwide experience infertility in their lifetime.

Infertility may be caused by a number of different factors, in either the male or female reproductive systems. It has significant negative social impacts on the lives of infertile couples and particularly women, who frequently experience violence, divorce, social stigma, emotional stress, depression, anxiety and low self-esteem.

The infertility can effectively be addressed by mitigating the need for costly and poorly accessible treatments to safe and effective fertility care. While assisted reproduction technologies (ART) have been available for more than three decades, with more than 5 million children born worldwide from ART interventions such as in vitro fertilization (IVF), these technologies are still largely unavailable, inaccessible and unaffordable in many parts of the world.

India is actively involved in research and innovation in the field of reproductive medicine, with many fertility clinics engaged in ongoing studies and advancements in ART procedures

To address the infertility in our state, the IVF Center Gandhi Hospital, Secunderabad has been established to provide accessible, and quality treatment with the commendable efforts of Director of Medical Education Dr. K. Ramesh Reddy, This is the first-of-its kind set-up in the country, an In-Vitro Fertility (IVF) center in the government sector with trained staff and the necessary infrastructure providing zero cost treatment.

The Center is established in 5324 sq yds with a world class IVF equipment and treatment of highly committed doctors. In order of increase the precision and results Artificial Intelligence has been merged into the IVF lab Facility egg quality, sperm quality and Embryo quality can be monitored.

This facility with a below poverty line patients as a targeted beneficiaries provides comprehensive and holistic approach with strongly committed team is a ray of hope for people of Telangana and neighbourhood states.


